The minutes of the previous meeting as published in the Bulletin were accepted as a true record on the motion of Ian Tanner, seconded by David Hemmings.

- The need for an assistant for George Hardy was mentioned to the assembled throng. A summation of his variety of roles was detailed and interest in assisting in these roles was sought from the floor. A deathly silence suggested a modicum of enthusiasm deficit had overwhelmed the members present. Hmm...
- It was also mentioned that we will also need a new recorder of benching results as Judith Barry intends standing down from this role after many years.

Mick's Rant

Mick began his talk by thanking the society for its condolences for his recent loss. He then gave members a rundown of Australian cymbidiums viz. *Cym. canaliculatum, C. madidum,* and *C. suave*. Mick detailed the essential differences between these species with regard to pseudobulb presence (a "classic" cymbidium feature), noting that *C. suave* possesses no such entity but instead possesses rhizomal growth with flowers emerging from these growths. *Cym. mastersii* (from India) possesses this same quality. It was stated that although *C. mastersii* is relatively easy to grow, the same cannot be said for *C. suave*. Some growers have had success with growing *C. suave* in three-foot terra cotta pipes. *C. madidum* was thought to be the easiest of the three natives to grow. A suave/madidum hybrid exists and may be named *Cymbidium* Kuranda.

He recommended members have a look at the Stony Range Reserve and view the orchids which were sourced from the Macquarie River Dam.

General Business:

Bill Dobson addressed members and produced a number of Sarcochilus orchids which were ^{Ir} thriving in 80mm web pots. *Sarco. fitzgeraldii* was said to prefer a moist, cool environment. ^a Being a lithophyte, it was suggested that water well pots could be useful here. However, it was noted that certain orchids such as *Den. smillieae* do not like water well pots.

Bill recommended weekly use of Auxinone in the October/November/December growing period to facilitate optimal growth.

Judges Report: Trish Peterson

Plant of the Evening:

Den. fleckeri 'Denistone Nugget' – Good grief!! This ridiculously well-grown specimen was produced by David Hemmings and stunned all with its abundant flowering and "why-don't- mine-ever-look-like-that?" prolific growth. This mounted monster was nine years old and was originally sourced from Mike Harrison. It is grown under shady conditions and watered daily. David elicited much covetous murmuring from all present when he announced that he will have deflasked seedlings of this plant available soon in the next year. This represents a remarkable opportunity for the lucky purchasers to pretend (for at least a while anyway) that they will be able to replicate this marvel.

Other Plants of Interest:

- Cymbidium canaliculatum a very impressive rendition of this native was grown by Peter D'Olier. It was apparently two years old and sourced from Kings Nursery. It was noted that this would make a wonderful Christmas present for the hard-working secretary.
- Den. victoriae reginae x goldsmitianum (Den. Kuniko) Li Shan presented this impressive display that was actually comprised of three plants and was sourced from Phil Spence. It resides in a tree fern mount.
- Rhinerrhiza divitiflora Eric Lielkajis produced this unusual specimen that has very short-lived flowers

Guest Speaker

Chris Murray entertained all with a remarkably interesting talk concerning his recent trip to Barrington Tops and what he found there. Chris seems to have an uncanny ability and dedication to venture into regions best left alone by normal bushwalkers to find orchids in situ. This talk was no exception and showed magnificent displays of *Den. falcorostrum* on Antarctic Beech trees, as well as many other orchids of the region. All enjoyed the vicarious pleasure of seeing these plants in their natural environment in comfort whilst Chris enjoyed the effects of less pleasant aspects of the region including Stinging Trees and numerous other spiky and/or parasitic life forms.

The Annual Members' Sarcochilus Competition

This annual competition then took place. Ten different plants (first place winners in their classes) were presented and member votes were recorded. Unusually, David Hemmings took the first prize here and will be awarded the Iris Pendle Memorial Trophy at the end of year prize-giving.

The above lovely orchid benched last month, and beautifully grown by Li Shan, is *Dendrobium* Kuniko a hybrid registered with the Royal Horticultural Society by S.Hoshino in 1983. It is originated by Sohma. It's a primary hybrid consisting of 2 species; *Dendrobium goldschmidtianum*, section: Pedilonum, and

Dendrobium victoriae-reginae, section: Calcarifera.

However, beautiful as it is, it is ineligible to be benched at ANOS meetings or a show. If anyone is in doubt about what their orchid is or where to place it at monthly meetings or shows you can check with me or one of the senior growers.

In My Bushhouse

Well, we are into November and Christmas is just around the corner, and my potting is going slowly, as both my wife and daughter came down with a bug. Speaking of which I caught a couple of Dendrobium beetles so have to initiate spraying. I'm probably a bit late as I have new growths on some *Den speciosum*. However i'll be spraying this week after the fabulous rain that we've just had, although then I'll have to mow the lawn[©].

I'm happy how things are proceeding in the bushhouse/backyard. The plants hanging on the clothesline are looking fabulous Aussie natives *Dendrobium jonesii* var. *magnificum, Cymbidium suave, Dendrobium speciosum* var. *boreale* and *Dockrillia racemosea*. I can't help but say that my Laelia anceps ALL have multiple growths and are looking fantastic. All plants have been dosed with slow-release fertiliser, and will be getting a dose of Peters Finisher, Auxinone, and Seasol on Monday.

Speaking of Slow-release fertiliser, I am working my way thru the bushhouse and have just about completed 2 benches with 2 more to go plus half the hanging plants. Just writing that down means that I'll be at it until February[®]. Aah, it is what it is, at least I'm working on it. I think I had more time when I was working[®]. Do you find that?

I have given the plants a dosing of fungicide and pesticide, as I still have a few of those pesky grey moths and I wanted to start the season off well. However keep an eye out for aphids as they can multiply out of proportion overnight.

So far everything is growing well, new growths on almost everything and i'd like to keep it that way.

Flowering at the moment are Bulbophyllum newportii, Cadetia taylori, Cymbidium canaliculatum, Cymbidium suave, Dendrobium canaliculatum, Dendrobium lichenstrum, Dendrobium prenticei, Dendrobium fleckeri, Dendrobium monophyllum, Dendrobium finniganense, Dockrillia racemosa, Sarcochilus fitzgeraldi, Sarcochilus niveus, and some odd Sarcochilus hybrids that will get repotted as soon at they finish flowering.

I've just finished fertilizing along with Seasol[®], and Auxinone[®], and the plants are looking good. Later on, today I'll mix up another batch of bark and clay balls to have ready and will continue to add some slow release to the rest of the hanging plants.

I've been growing *Phreatia crassiuscula* in my Bushhouse in Sydney for a few years now and thought it about time I photographed it. It has the tiniest of flowers approx 1mm across, and challenging as it's akin to photographing the head of a pin[©]. However, as I'm taking photos I had a visitor a tiny black ant. I Couldn't believe my luck.

That's enough for the moment, as I have to go for a walk to keep my bones moving.

IRA BUTLER TROPHY COMPETITION

The Ira Butler Tophy Competitions were set up to encourage and promote the breeding and cultivation of Australian and Australasian Orchids. The competition was established in 1974 for Australian native hybrids, Australian native species were included in 1985 and Australasian hybrids and species were included in 2004.

There are four classes in the competition which is judged annually, generally in February based on the plants submitted in the previous calendar year.

- Ira Butler Trophy,
- Champion Australian Native Hybrid of the Year Champion Australian Native Species of the Year
- Bill Murdoch Trophy,
 Champion Australian Native Species of the Year
- G Hermon Slade Hybrid Trophy, Champion Australasian Native Hybrid of the Year
- G Hermon Slade Species Trophy, Champion Australasian Native Species of the Year

Conditions for Nomination

Nominations for any of the trophies may come from:

- the Champion at a show,
- the winner of its section or class if there was no Champion.
- plants which have been awarded an FCC, AM, HCC or AD by any recognized judging authority.


The best orchid in each class will be awarded a Trophy, for the champion for the year. Up to 5 Silver certificates maybe awarded each year in each class depending on the number of entries and at the judges discretion.

The champion at shows where they are judged by the members or popular vote are also eligible.

Once a plant has won a Trophy, it shall be ineligible for further nomination. Except in cases where the plant has received a higher award, or where it qualified previously as a champion has been awarded.

The nomination form and the fee of \$15 has been submitted.
